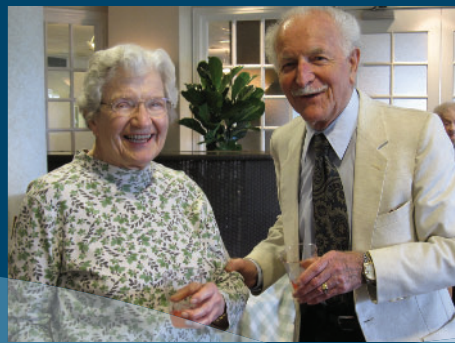

# Relationships Matter

## Queen Anne Rotary Club

The Queen Anne Rotary Club has been a part of the lives of local children and our residents for more than 18 years. Manners-at-the-Manor, a Rotary sponsored program at Bayview, is committed to the intergenerational experience of local school children and our resident population. Separated by six or seven decades of life, common ground is quickly found at lunch in Bayview's dining room as correct forks are used, napkins are placed on laps, and conversations become timeless. Queen Anne Rotarians, in sponsoring these luncheons, have introduced nearly 1,600 fourth and fifth grade students from Coe Elementary School on Queen Anne to both good table manners and great conversations that bring the generations together. Bayview is very grateful to Mr. Bill Heathman, who on behalf of the Queen Anne Rotary, has been leading this program since 1992.

Following each luncheon, Bayview residents and Rotarians exchange nametags with their student guests. With great anticipation, hosts await the letters that soon arrive from the students with their thoughts and comments on this very unique experience. In a recent letter from Sam, he told Rotary leaders that he was not only appreciative of the dictionary that he received from the Rotary, but thought that it was wonderful that Rotary helped save lives in countries around the world through clean water and health programs. In Sam's words, "it is really great that you guys have almost gotten rid of Polio around the globe."

Rotary International is the world's first service club organization, with more than 1.2 million members in 33,000 clubs worldwide. Rotary club members are volunteers who work locally, regionally, and internationally to combat hunger, improve health and sanitation, provide education and job training, promote peace, and eradicate polio under the motto *Service Above Self*.

Bayview is grateful to Rotary for the work they do internationally and here on Queen Anne with Bayview and Coe Elementary.

## Ballard Lions Club

Since opening its doors in 1925, the Ballard Lions Club has been serving those in need of vision and hearing support. Financed through philanthropy and fund-raising events such as the Easter Sunday Pancake Breakfast, the Lions have raised money for many special causes locally and around the world, including the Telephone Book Recycling drive. Through the drive the Ballard Lions have saved trees and raised thousands of dollars for the Lions Eye Bank. From well-known White Cane Days to Crab feeds and Christmas Swag sales, the Lions are creative, powerful and energetic in finding ways to raise the funds to serve Ballard, Queen Anne, and other Seattle neighborhoods.

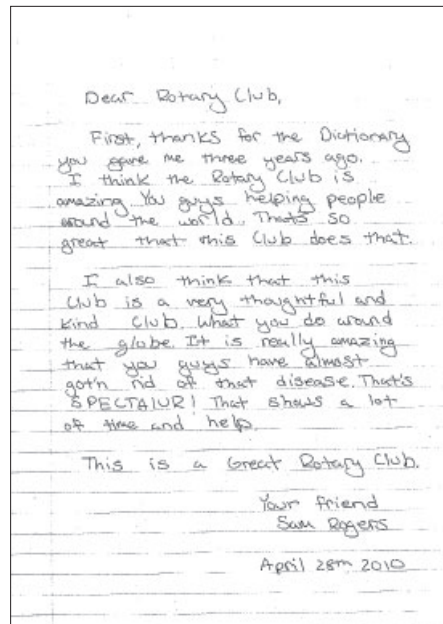
The depth and breadth of the groups touched by Lions is incredible. Food baskets for Thanksgiving and Christmas, free eyeglasses, eye surgeries, hearing aids, academic tuition for blind students, and support for local schools are all close to their heart. Additionally, senior centers, hospitals, and retirement communities all benefit from the gifts of the Ballard Lions Foundation.

The Lions have shown their generosity here at Bayview as well. Earlier in 2010 they donated a sophisticated hearing technology platform to the community.

In 1995, the club was made one of seven beneficiaries of the Harry L. & Clare Cayo Wilson Charitable Trust. Harry Wilson, owner of one of the oldest Ford dealerships in the country, was one of the Ballard Lions charter

members and continued to be a member until his death in 1995. Working hand-in-hand, proceeds from the Wilson Charitable Trust and the Ballard Lions Club Foundation play a major role in support of the Lions mobile health unit, which provides free medical screening at venues throughout the Northwest.

The Ballard Lions Foundation was created in 1999 with a major donation made by member Harold Price and is used to provide support in distributing funds coming from the Wilson Charitable Trust. The Foundation is the perfect way for friends and members to make tax-deductible contributions that support local need. Funds from the Foundation support a tradition of service to our community known by Lions Club members as *Lionism*. ■

## Variety is the Spice of Life at Bayview

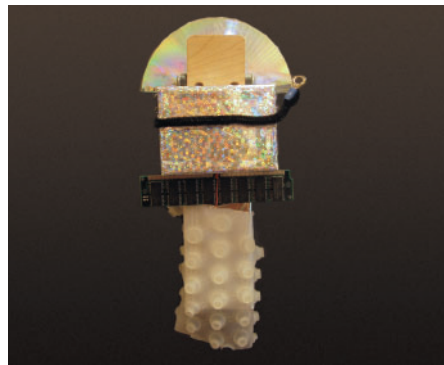

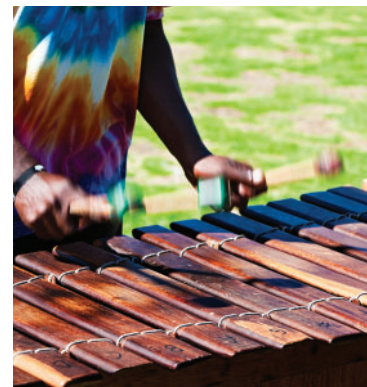


### Summer Full of Programs
